# <u>Safety Officer's Report – Donald Gregg</u>

It is that time of year again. Spring is upon us and soon we'll be enjoying warm temperatures with light winds; perfect for flying. Now is a great time to review a few safety considerations. I know we already know all of this but it never hurts to be reminded when it comes to safety.

Many of our planes have been hibernating through the Winter, along with our

LiPo batteries. Keep a watchful eye on your batteries when charging them for the first time this season. Charge them in an open, non-combustible area, ideally in a LiPo bag or fire-proof charging station. It is possible that a cell may have gone bad. Did you know that LiPo batteries burn at several thousand degrees and do not need oxygen to burn?

Now is also a good time to review your AMA and FAA registrations. Your FAA registration is good for two years. You don't want to find out that your registration expired on the weekend that you want to go flying.

The beginning of the flying season is a great time to thoroughly inspect your aircraft for damage and needed repairs. Look for loose control horns and retainers, hinges and loose or missing screws. Maybe you had some hard landings last season? Look for broken glue joints on the airframe. Now is also a good time to replace old fuel lines.





Please review the field diagram included in this newsletter for the no-fly zones. Remember that you should not fly within 25 feet of any person except when taking off or landing. We need to be mindful about keeping other fliers informed of our intentions. Be sure to call out 'Landing', 'Taking Off'', 'Dead Stick', and when retrieving a plane, 'On The Field''. When we see our buddy with an awesome new plane this Spring, the impulse is to walk out to the flightline to check it out; We all need to be mindful of



staying behind the flight line unless we are actively flying.

Finally, there is a First Aid kit in the shed, just inside the door. It is good to keep this in mind if you or another member is the unfortunate victim of a prop strike or other injury.

Let's have a safe flying season this year.

#### <u> Airfield Manager Report – Brett McKay</u>

Five new aircraft field stands have been completed. They are currently underneath the shelter and will be rolled out to the field in April. I will coordinate with Mike Ryan, Thunderbird President, to decide which of the 10 current stands will be replaced by the new ones.







The 4 new pilot safety barriers have been completed and will also be put up at each of the flying stations in April. Tim Hartong has approved leaving them up through the summer. They are easily removable for lawn mowing. There are red plugs in each of the holes that hold the fence posts. Please leave those in when the fences are not installed. They are currently stored on racks behind the lawn mower shed.

Lawn mowing for the season will begin in the next few weeks. We are currently purchasing all the maintenance items for the



mowers to get them ready for this season. As we have in the past, the plan is to mow on Tuesdays in preparation for training nights and again on Friday's for the weekends. Weather permitting, we usually plan to mow on those days from 8:00 - 10:30AM. These times and days may sometimes change based on the weather.

Finally, the lock on the gate has been lubricated and is much easier to use. Remember to lock up if you are the last one leaving the field.

# FAA / AMA Requirements:

- 1. <u>TRUST</u>. Members should take "The Recreational UAS Safety Test" available on the AMA website. UAS is the acronym for Unmanned Aircraft Systems commonly known as drowns.
- 2. <u>Register with the FAA</u> (\$5 for 3 years) and display the FAA number on all drowns. Registration can be done through the AMA website.
